THE HISTORY

Southern New Hampshire University was founded in 1932 by H.A.B. Shapiro as the New Hampshire School of Accounting and Secretarial Science. The school remained relatively small until 1961 when it was incorporated and renamed New Hampshire College of Accounting and Commerce.

In 1963 the State of New Hampshire granted the college its charter which gave it degree-granting authority. That same year the first associate's degrees were awarded and three years later the first bachelor's degrees were conferred.

The college became a non-profit institution under a board of trustees in September, 1968. In 1969 the name was shortened to New Hampshire College. In 1971 the college moved from its downtown Manchester site to a new 200-acre campus on the Merrimack River. The college introduced a master of business administration program in 1974 and doctoral programs were launched in 1998.

A decision was made to make the move to university status following two years of research, and on July 1, 2001 New Hampshire College became Southern New Hampshire University.

The university has a day college enrollment of nearly 1,800 students, 1,600 in the Graduate School of Business and close to 4,000 distance and continuing education students. More than 100 full-time faculty, supported by dedicated and experienced part-time faculty, serve the educational needs of the university's diverse student body.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

The School of Business offers bachelor degrees in accounting, accounting/finance, advertising, business administration, business studies, economics/finance, fashion merchandising, information technology, international business, management advisory services, marketing, retailing, sport management and technical management. Associate degrees are also offered in accounting, business administration, fashion merchandising, information technology, liberal arts and marketing. The School of Liberal Arts offers bachelor degrees in advertising, communication, creative writing and English, digital media, economics, English language and literature, graphic design, history, humanities, liberal arts, political science, psychology, public relations and social science. The School of Teacher Education offers bachelor of science degrees in business teacher education, early childhood education, elementary/general special education, English teacher education, marketing teacher education and social studies teacher education. The School of Hospitality, Tourism & Culinary Arts offers bachelor degrees in club management, convention and event management, culinary arts, destination management, food and beverage management, hospitality administration, hotel and resort management and travel management. An associate of applied science degree in culinary arts is also offered by the university.

ACCREDITATION and MEMBERSHIP

Southern New Hampshire University is accredited by the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs, New England Association of Schools and Colleges, the New Hampshire Postsecondary Education Commission, the New Hampshire State Department of Education for Teacher Certification and the American Culinary Federation and the Sport Management Review Council.

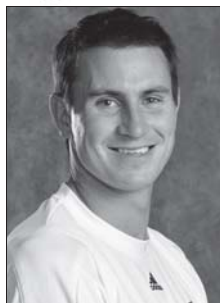

THE COACHING STAFF



MARC HUBBARD

Head Coach

Marc Hubbard was named the seventh head coach in Southern New Hampshire University men's soccer history on January 9, 2008.

A native of Durham, NH, Hubbard spent the past five seasons as head coach Rob Thompson's top assistant at the University of New Hampshire.

During his tenure, the Wildcats advanced to the

America East Conference semifinals in 2006 and 2007 and posted a 12-5-3 record in 2006 which earned the UNH coaching staff the America East Coaching Staff of the Year award. In 2005 New Hampshire was ranked No. 1 in New England for just the second time in program history and was ranked No. 23 nationally. UNH was 40-30-21 over Hubbard's tenure and during that span produced two America East Goalkeeper of the Year selections, one Rookie of the Year, one Offensive Player of the Year, 14 All-America East and seven NSCAA All-Region players.

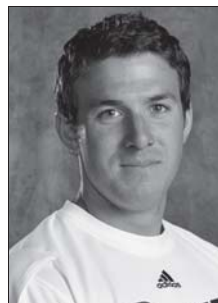
UNH's success during Hubbard's tenure came off the field as well as the program had its first Academic All-American in 2005. 29 players earned All-Academic honors from America East, while in 2007 New Hampshire earned recognition from the NCAA for its Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 995. The Wildcats also received a NSCAA Team Academic Achievement Award in 2006 and 2007.

A 2003 graduate of Colgate University, Hubbard enjoyed a stellar four-year career with the Raiders. He was a three-time Patriot League Second Team selection and earned NSCAA All-New York honors as a senior. Hubbard also served as team captain and was the president of Colgate's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) from 2001-03.

Hubbard has also played on the professional level, spending the past three years with the New Hampshire Phantoms of the USL Second

Division, serving as team captain in 2006 & 2007. In 2006, Hubbard was a USL First Team selection and a Defender of the Year finalist. He also has professional experience with the Wilmington (NC) Hammerheads and the Syracuse Salty Dogs.

Hubbard graduated from Colgate in 2003 with a degree in Political Science. He later went on to earn his master's at UNH in Kinesiology: Sports Studies in 2006.



ROB DOW

Assistant Coach

Rob Dow enters his first season at Southern New Hampshire.

Dow has spent the last two seasons as head men's soccer coach at Dean College in Franklin, MA. While there, Dow compiled a 18-11-4 record, qualified for the NJCAA Region 21 playoffs in 2007 and coached seven NJCAA All-Region players. Prior to that, Dow spent two seasons as the men's and women's assistant

coach at Mayville (ND) State University and a season as an assistant for the men's team at his alma mater, the University of Maine.

A 2003 graduate of Maine with a degree in Management, Dow was four-year member of the Maine soccer team and led the Black Bears in scoring twice as well as being named an America East Scholar Athlete for three seasons. Dow later earned his master's in Sport and Recreation Management from North Dakota State University in 2005. He would go on to play professionally with the Ottawa Wizards and then the New Hampshire Phantoms.

Dow has also coached on the club level with Odyssey Sport '97 in Portland, ME and currently coaches the Seacoast United U-13 Premier side.



DAVE WILLIAMS

Assistant Coach

Dave Williams, who previously worked with SNHU head coach Marc Hubbard at the University of New Hampshire, is entering his first season as an assistant coach.

Williams, who will work primarily with the Penmen goalies, has served as an assistant coach at UNH for the past three seasons where he has worked with the Wildcat keepers. A former Division I keeper at Cornell University from 1988

to 1991, Williams earned three shutouts as a senior. Williams graduated from Cornell in 1992 with a degree in human development. After graduation, he played professionally for the San Diego Top Guns of the USISL and the Colorado Foxes of the A-League.

He currently serves as the Vice-President of Operations for Calley & Currier. His brother Doug was a member of the United States Cycling Team in 1982 and 1983. Originally from Denver, Colo., Williams now lives in Rye, NH.

2008 PREVIEW

While the Southern New Hampshire University men's soccer team reached the Northeast-10 Tournament for the eighth straight season in 2007, it would be hard to find anyone who considered last season a success for one of the top programs in Division II history. The Penmen suffered their first sub-.500 season since before many of the players were born, and were quickly eliminated from the NE-10 tourney by eventual national champion Franklin Pierce.

First-year head coach **Marc Hubbard**, who spent five years as an assistant at the University of New Hampshire prior to his arrival at SNHU last winter, wants to get the Penmen back on track and make sure last season was nothing more than an aberration. Southern New Hampshire returns 13 players from last season, including a pair of NE-10 All-Conference performers, while also adding 11 newcomers who will look to add immediate depth in several key positions for 2008.

"Our success this year will have to rely on many factors," said Hubbard, whose team was picked sixth in the NE-10 preseason poll. "One is our depth. Everyone on this roster will play a strong role on the field and it is vital that guys are ready to come off the bench and do their jobs. The second is resiliency. I challenge our team to remain strong and weather the storm when things are not going our way. The third is sacrifice. If we want to be as successful as we say we do, then players have to sacrifice their egos and think about the team first,"

"The fourth is trust. Everyone needs to trust one another: teammate to teammate, coach to player and player to coach. If we can trust everyone to do their jobs and roles, then we can go a long way this year. The final factor is luck. Every team needs to have the ball bounce their way at points during the season. If we can dodge some bullets as well as stay healthy, who knows how far we can go within the conference."

The strength of last season's team was defense. Last season the Penmen allowed just 18 goals in 17 regular season

games and posted six shutouts. SNHU returns two All-Conference performers in **Matt Delaney** (Wallasey, England) and **Richard Kentish** (Kingston, Jamaica). Delaney, an All-New England pick, is in his third year with the program, also led the team in scoring last season with five goals. Kentish, a transfer from UConn last summer who was voted team MVP in his first season with the program last year, started all but one game on the backline.

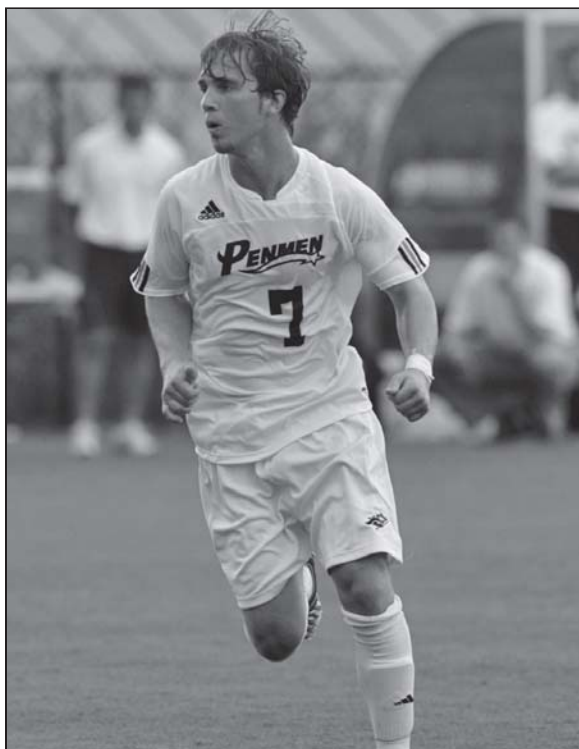
The Penmen also return three other players in the backfield, senior **Ransford Shand** (Brooklyn, NY) and sophomores **Jon Brockway** (Lebanon, NH) and **Paul D'Angelo** (Gloucester, MA). Shand played in nine games last season while Brockway appeared in 12 contests. D'Angelo played in 15 games as a freshman and started 13 times.

Despite the success of the defense last season, Hubbard has challenged the backline to be even stronger this season.

"The defense might have been solid but not solid enough. My expectations are to be stronger defensively than last year. Last year's team was winless on the road. The good thing about soccer is that you do not have to score to get a result. If we continue to keep opponents off the scoreboard, then we will not have to rely on players offensively to do more than they are capable of."

SNHU welcomes a pair of newcomers defensively in **Jayme Kapinos** (Ludlow, MA) and **PJ Burnette** (Brunswick, ME). Kapinos, a two-time All-Western Mass. selection at Ludlow HS, helped lead Avon Old Farms to a NEPSAC Class A title as a postgrad and may also play in the midfield. Burnette led Brunswick HS to a 20-0 record and an Eastern Maine crown as a senior.

In goal, the Penmen no longer have Dan Pelc to rely on. Pelc was a four-year starter and wrapped up his career tied for second in program history in career shutouts. Senior **Sean Lambert** (Rehoboth, MA) is the lone returner between the pipes. Last season, Lambert posted two shutouts in three starts and

registered a 0.30 goals-against average. He will be challenged by a pair of freshmen, **Joey Kapinos** (Ludlow, MA), the twin brother of Jayme, and **Mark Painchaud** (Concord, NH). Kapinos posted a 0.47 goals-against average with 12 shutouts at Avon Old Farms last season, while Painchaud was an All-State keeper last season at Concord HS.

"The goalies have been working hard to help push one another to get better. Our team defense is good but there will certainly be some times where we will need our goalies to make big saves to help us win or stay in games," said Hubbard.

While defense may have been SNHU's strength last season, offense may have been its bane. The Penmen mustered just 15 goals all season and were kept off the scoreboard eight times. Several returners will be looked to for increased offensive output; graduate student **Gabe Mercier** (Middleboro, MA), juniors **Kevin Woods** (Alyth, Scotland) and **Paulson Edum** (Calabar, Nigeria) and sophomores **Danny Hernandez** (Salem, NH), **Michael Adam** (Ludlow, MA) and **Mark Cotton** (Londonderry, NH).

Mercier had a knack for coming up with clutch goals last season, scoring the game-winners in 1-0 wins over Saint Anselm and AIC. Woods totaled a goal and three assists last season while Edum started all 18 games last season and had two goals and an assist. Hernandez started all 18 games as a freshman and finished with two goals and an assist while Adam, a midfielder, had two assists in a win over Bentley and started 13 times in his first year. Cotton played in 15 games and will be looked to primarily as a midfielder.

Brendan Joseph (Bedford, NH) also returns to the program after last suiting up for SNHU in 2005. In 24 games over his first two seasons, Joseph, a former Manchester West standout, tallied a goal and six assists.

Hubbard hopes immediate help in the goal-scoring department can come from transfers **Adrian Schippers** (Ashby, MA), **Jonathan Coache** (Bow, NH) and Jamie Phillips (Hampton,

NH). Schippers spent the past two seasons at Springfield College, where he was the 2006 NEWMAC Rookie of the Year and scored 16 goals in two seasons with the Pride. Coache, who is a graduate student, spent three seasons at Division I Liberty. He graduated from Bow HS as the third-leading scorer in New Hampshire high school history. Phillips totaled 19 goals and seven assists last season at Dean College, where he played for current SNHU assistant Rob Dow.

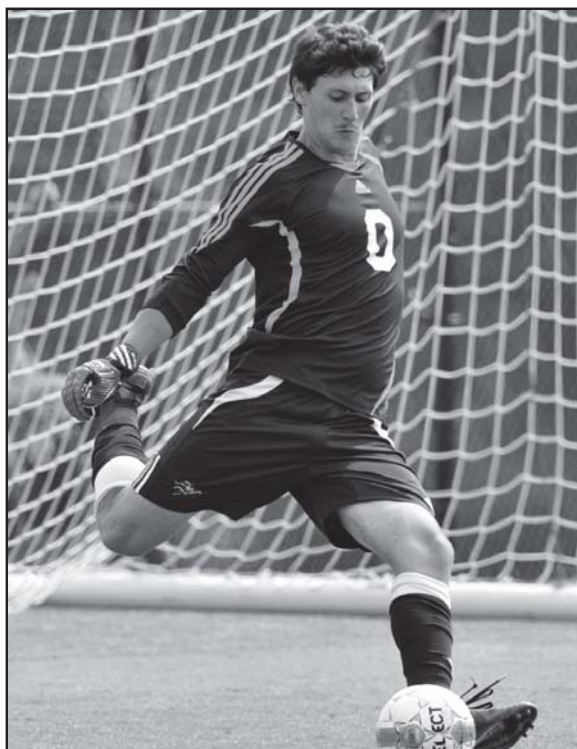
Also looking to break in either up front or in the midfield are freshmen **Ethan Lapierre** (Manchester, NH), **Rob Lucas** (Hooksett, NH) and **Shane O'Neill** (Gloucester, MA). Lapierre had nine goals and 20 assists as a senior at Manchester Memorial HS, while Lucas, playing for rival Central, totaled 13 goals and 16 assists as a senior. Both were All-State selections. O'Neill had 10 goals and 12 assists as a senior at Gloucester HS and was an All-State selection in Massachusetts.

With so many newcomers, Hubbard expects the Penmen, who kick off with a home game August 28 against C.W. Post, to get stronger as the season wears on, and hopefully, that season will carry deep into November.

"Our young players are not going to get experienced overnight. The first year is always a learning process. That doesn't mean first

year players cannot be effective, they just have to adapt quicker to college life at SNHU. Our experienced players are good leaders for our younger guys to model after," Hubbard explained.

"General themes I have emphasized on since my arrival are to work hard, stay disciplined and not cut any corners. This applies to all facets of my job. If I can instill and reinforce these values into the team, we are talented enough to achieve great things this year."





NORTHEAST-10 CONFERENCE

As it enters a new chapter of its history in 2008, the Northeast-10 Conference continues to establish itself as one of the premier all-around NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. The NE-10 is now the second largest Division II conference in the country and is comprised of 15 institutions, six from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, three each from New York and New Hampshire, two from Connecticut and one from Vermont.

Founded in 1980 as the Northeast-7, the charter members were American International College, Assumption College, Bentley College, Bryant College, the University of Hartford, Springfield College and Stonehill College.

Saint Anselm College was admitted to the conference in 1981 and Merrimack College joined the fold in 1984, replacing Hartford, now a Division I institution. The conference expanded from eight to ten teams with the addition of Quinnipiac College and Saint Michael's College in 1987.

Springfield left the conference for Division III following the completion of the 1994-95 academic year. The conference returned to ten teams in 1996-97 with the addition of Le Moyne College and then expanded to 11 in 1997-98 with the inclusion of Pace University. In 1998-99, the conference reverted to ten schools when Quinnipiac shifted its programs to Division I.

The NE-10 expanded to fifteen institutions beginning with the 2000-01 academic year. The five new institutions included former New England Collegiate Conference members Franklin Pierce College, the University of Massachusetts Lowell, Southern Connecticut State University and Southern New Hampshire University; and former New York Collegiate Athletic Conference member College of Saint Rose.

University of New Haven, a former conference rival of several NE-10 members, will join the conference in the fall of 2008. The Chargers take the place of Bryant, which moved to the Division I level following the 2007-08 academic year. The Northeast-10 expands to 16 institutions in the fall of 2009 when Adelphi University joins the fold.

The Conference sponsors 23 championships, the most of any Division II conference.



SNHU claimed the NE-10 Tournament championship in 2000 and 2002 and has qualified for the conference tournament every season since joining the league.

LARKIN FIELD - HOME OF THE PENMEN

Southern New Hampshire University officially dedicated its soccer field to former Vice President for Student Affairs **Dr. George J. Larkin** during a ceremony held April 23, 2004. The field will now be referred to as "Dr. George J. Larkin Field." It was previously known as Penmen Field. Larkin, who served the university for 38 years, retired at the conclusion of the 2003-04 school year.

Current President **Dr. Paul J. LeBlanc**, President Emeritus **Dr. Richard Gustafson** and SNHU Board of Trustee member **Ann Lally** spoke on behalf of the university prior to the unveiling of the new signage, which is located at the entrance to the facility.

Richard Courtemanche, chairman of the Board of Trustees, Athletic Director **Joseph "Chip" Polak**, Associate Athletic Director **Ray Prouty** and **Pauline Larkin**, his wife, also took part in the unveiling, which was well attended by the SNHU community, as well as, Larkin's family.

"I am honored to be a part of this celebration," said Gustafson, who worked closely with Larkin during his 16 years as President. "George Larkin has a rock solid core of values, and that is why we admire him and honor him today."

"This is the highest honor we can bestow on an individual," commented LeBlanc just prior to the unveiling. "Decades from now George Larkin's name will remain an important part of this university."

A reception followed the unveiling where Larkin was presented with gifts to commemorate the day and his retirement. The Student Government Association presented him with a SNHU jersey with his name the number 38, in recognition of his years 38 years of service. The Alumni Association enlarged and framed the invitation used for the ceremony. The campus community presented Larkin with a framed painting by local artist Susan Callihan of Peterborough, that includes three paintings depicting the changing face of SNHU over the years.

"Prior to today the only signage on the field was one that read Home of the Champions," said Polak before introducing Larkin during the reception. "That is very appropriate, because now the field is named for a man who is a true champion."

SNHU's men's and women's soccer and men's and women's lacrosse teams play their home games on the field, which is also used for numerous recreational and intramural activities.

Larkin has oversaw the athletic department from 1969 to 2004 and served as Vice President for Student Affairs from 1983 to 2004. SNHU developed into one the premier Division II athletic programs in the nation under his guidance, claiming numerous Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) regional championships, and the 1989 NCAA National Championship in men's soccer.

He was also instrumental in SNHU's move from the now-defunct New England Collegiate Conference to the Northeast-10 Conference, considered by many to be the premier Division II league in the country.

He also established a strict policy that every student-athlete must maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average in order to be eligible to participate in a varsity sport at SNHU. This is higher than the NCAA standard and is based on the fact that the entire student body at the University is required to earn a cumulative GPA of 2.0 in order to graduate. This policy paid off in the summer of 2001 when SNHU earned the inaugural USA Today/NCAA Foundation Academic Achievement Award in recognition of high graduation rates among its student-athletes.

Larkin Field and the entire facility received a major facelift during the summer of 2003, and the facility now ranks as one the best in the region.

Two days after the 2003 commencement was held on the field the bulldozers arrived on campus and began the process of replacing the existing grass field with the state-of-the art FieldTurf surface. Viewed by many as the "ultimate all-weather surface", FieldTurf is a revolutionary sports surface that provides the perfect playing conditions all year long. It looks like grass, feels like grass and plays like grass.

Additional improvements to the facility included new permanent bleachers, a new scoreboard and a new "fully-wired" press box.

With over 600 installations in over 20 countries, FieldTurf is widely

considered to be the top producer of artificial grass. The University of Michigan recently selected FieldTurf for its legendary Michigan Stadium, and over 20 NCAA universities have FieldTurf in their stadiums.

U.S. Soccer, the governing body for soccer in the United States, also recently selected FieldTurf for its Home Depot National Training Center in Carson, Calif. St. John's University, one of the top Division 1 men's soccer programs in the country, selected FieldTurf for its surface at Belson Stadium. A soccer-only facility, Belson Stadium opened this past fall and is considered the top college soccer facility in the country.

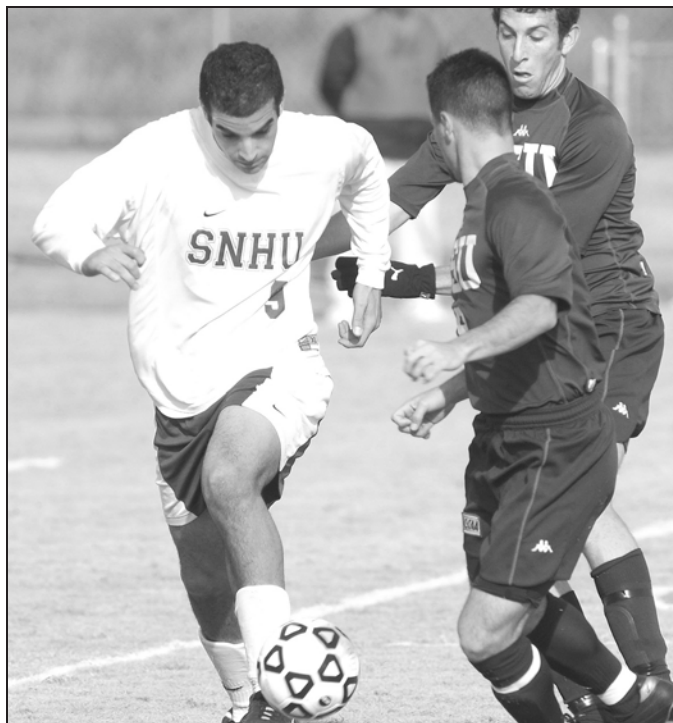

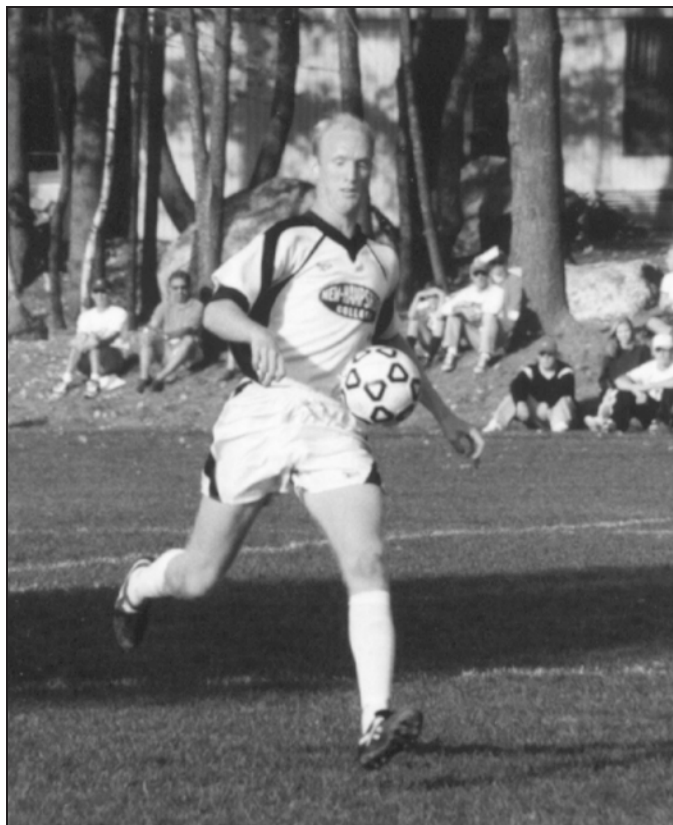
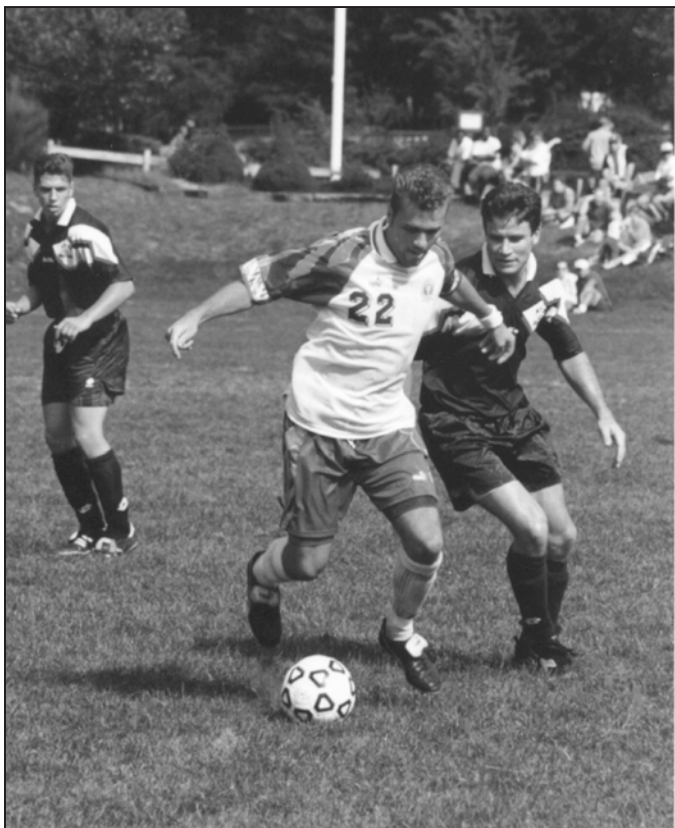

Southern New Hampshire University currently has two alumni active in Major League Soccer. **John Guppy** '90 is the President and CEO of the Chicago Fire, while **Preston Burpo** '95 signed with Chivas USA prior to the 2006 season and currently plays for the Colorado Rapids. In addition **Altimont "Freddie" Butler** '94 went on to play for the San Jose Clash following his All-American career at Southern New Hampshire University.

Guppy was named President and CEO of the Chicago Fire in 2005 following a successful five-year career with the MetroStars (now the New York Red Bulls). He was named Executive Vice President in 2002, having served as Vice President of Marketing & Sales during his first two years with the team.

Burpo signed with Chivas USA following a nine-year stay with the Seattle Sounders of the United Soccer League (USL) First Division. He led Seattle to a league title and was named Most Valuable Player of the USL championship match in 2005.

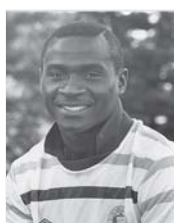

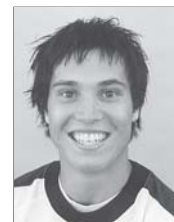

SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE UNIVERSITY

LOCATION

Southern New Hampshire University is located in an area that gives students the best of both worlds. The culture and facilities of urban areas are close by, while the beauty and recreational diversity of the New Hampshire north country is within a short drive. The campus sits on the edge of Manchester, a city of 100,000 people and New Hampshire's business center. It is home to museums, theatres, retail centers and quality restaurants. Convenient interstate highways bisect Manchester's bustling perimeters and air service connects Manchester with all major cities in the United States.

Just an hour south is Boston, with all of its cultural advantages and activities. Boston is home to the world-class Museum of Science and Fine Arts Museum, as well as the Boston Red Sox, Bruins, Celtics and New England Patriots. To the north, students have access to the wilderness and recreational areas of the White Mountains and the Lakes Region. The White Mountains offer some of the best hiking in the country and the best skiing in New England.

The location of the campus enables SNHU to provide students with access to the kinds of recreational and cultural opportunities that add greatly to the experience of going to college. Finally, New Hampshire ranks 48th nationally in violent crime and there is a comprehensive security program in place at SNHU which has produced a remarkable safety record.

VISITING SNHU

Personal interviews and campus tours are strongly recommended. Tours and interviews are conducted Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. throughout the year and on Saturday mornings during the academic year. Appointments for interviews and/or tours may be arranged by calling the admission office at (603) 645-9611.

DIRECTIONS

Heading North Via I-93

Take exit 9N from I-93 onto U.S. 3/Route 28 heading north. Turn left at the first intersection onto West Alice Drive, which becomes Donati Drive at the sharp curve. At the end of Donati Drive turn right onto Bicentennial Drive. At the first stop sign turn right onto North River Road. SNHU is 1/4 mile on the left.

Heading North Via Everett Turnpike (Route 3)

Take Route 3 to I-293 North to Exit 6. Cross the Amoskeag Bridge and turn left at the first intersection onto Elm Street. Stay on Elm Street for 1 mile then turn left onto Bennington Road. Go one block and turn right onto North River Road. SNHU is 1.5 miles on the left.

Heading South Via I-93

Follow I-93 South to Exit 9N. Proceed north on U.S. 3/Route 28 as above.

ATHLETICS

The rich tradition of athletics has long been a source of pride for the family and friends of Southern New Hampshire University. Since the glory days of the Greater Boston Small College Conference, to the present status as a NCAA Division II powerhouse—the Penmen have maintained a level of excellence that is second to none.

SNHU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, the Eastern College Athletic Conference and the Northeast-10 Conference. Men's teams are fielded in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, hockey, lacrosse, soccer and tennis. Women's teams include basketball, cheerleading, cross country, lacrosse, soccer, softball, tennis and volleyball.

Numerous individual and team achievements in recent years have brought SNHU both regional and national recognition. Topping the list of recent success stories is the 1989 NCAA Division II National Championship in men's soccer. The men's soccer team has participated in 13 of the last 22 NCAA Tournaments, while the women's soccer team claimed seven of a possible 13 ECAC Division II titles from 1984 to 1996 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 1997 and 2003.

The men's basketball team, a long-time New England power, has participated in 16 NCAA Tournaments since 1980. The Penmen have claimed six NCAA Regional titles and advanced to the Division II "Final Four" in 1993 and 1994. The women's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 1988 and 1990 and captured the ECAC Division II title in 1991. The hockey team participated in the final NCAA Division II Championship Series in 1999 and has advanced to a post-season tournament each of the last ten years.

The baseball team claimed its first-ever ECAC Division II title in 1997, while the softball team made its first-ever appearance in the NCAA Division II Tournament in 2006. The golf team claimed the Northeast-10 championship in 2001 and 2002, and participated in the NCAA Regional in 2002 and 2006. The men's lacrosse team advanced to the ECAC Tournament in 1995, while the women's lacrosse team advanced to the championship game of the NE-10 Tournament in 2008. The men's and women's tennis and volleyball teams have all qualified for the NE-10 Tournament in recent years.

SNHU students succeeded off the field as well. Proof of this came in September of 2001 when the University was one of nine recipients of the inaugural USA Today/NCAA Foundation Academic Achievement Award, in recognition of high graduation rates among student-athletes. SNHU also claimed the Northeast-10 Conference Academic Achievement Award following the 2001-02 school year.
